**MOTIONS**

**ARTICLE 1. MOVED:** That the Town vote to receive and act upon the reports of the Officers of the Town and to receive the report of any committees and act thereon.

**ARTICLE 2. MOVED:** That the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, or other Town departments with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to apply for and accept grants from the Federal Government, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, or any other source, and to expend the same for purposes received without further appropriation.

**ARTICLE 3. MOVED:** That the Town vote in accordance with Massachusetts General Law Chapter 44, Section 53E ½, as amended, to reauthorize a revolving fund for the Hazardous Materials Response Planning Committee (a.k.a. the SARA Title III Committee) into which fund will be placed the fees collected from individuals responsible for oil and hazardous material spills, and to further authorize the SARA Title III Committee to expend up to a maximum of \$7,500 from the Revolving Fund for the purpose of cleaning up oil and hazardous material spills.

**ARTICLE 4. MOVED:** That the Town vote to fix the salaries of all elected officials as required by law for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2010.

**ARTICLE 8. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$91,725 for the purpose of funding the operations, maintenance, and debt service of the Colle Building, said sum to be raised from Colle Receipts Reserved for Appropriation.

**ARTICLE 9. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$36,540 for the purpose of operating the Turners Falls Airport, with \$6,277 to be raised from Taxation and \$30,263 to be raised from Airport User Fees.

**ARTICLE 10. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$627,663 for the purpose of paying the Franklin County Technical School District for Montague's share of the assessment for the yearly operation of the Franklin County Technical School said sum to be raised from Taxation.

**ARTICLE 11. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,616,878 for the purpose of paying the Gill-Montague Regional School District for Montague's share of the assessment for the yearly operation of the Gill-Montague Regional Schools, with \$125,000 to be raised from Free Cash and \$7,491,878 to be raised from Taxation.

**ARTICLE 12. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$113,000 for the purpose of making repairs to the Sheffield School Roof, said sum to be raised from Borrowing.

**ARTICLE 13. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,200 for the purpose of funding information technology equipment, parts, accessories, software and installations, said sum to be raised from Stabilization.

**ARTICLE 14. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$35,000 for the purpose of funding a police cruiser and related expenses, said sum to be raised from Stabilization

**ARTICLE 15. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of funding purchases and major repairs of DPW vehicles and equipment, said sum to be raised from Stabilization.

**ARTICLE 16. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$54,055 for the purpose of funding lease payments for 2 Six Wheel Dump Trucks, said sum to be raised from Stabilization.

**ARTICLE 17. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the purpose of replacing swing sets at Highland Park in Millers Falls, said sum to be raised from Taxation.

**ARTICLE 18. MOVED:** That the Town vote to transfer from the Board of Selectmen/Highway Commissioners the custody of a parcel of land formerly known as "Williams Way" to the Parks and Recreation Commission for use as part of the Unity Park.

**ARTICLE 19. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of funding the purchase and installation of an outdoor public bulletin board for the Town Hall, said sum to be raised from Free Cash.

**ARTICLE 20. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$24,459 to be transferred into the Franklin County Technical School Stabilization Fund, said sum to be raised from the remaining balance of the FY10 appropriation for the Franklin County Technical School.

**ARTICLE 21. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to be transferred from Free Cash into the Town of Montague Stabilization Fund, said sum to be raised from Free Cash.

**ARTICLE 22. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$65,000 to be transferred into the Town of Montague Stabilization Fund, said sum to be raised from the remaining balance of Article #16 of the March 23, 2006 Town Meeting [Multipurpose Feasibility Study].

**ARTICLE 23. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,345 to be transferred into the Town of Montague Stabilization Fund, said sum to be raised from the remaining balance of Article #3 of the July 8, 1999 Town Meeting [Dry Hill Road Legal].

**ARTICLE 24. MOVED:** That the Town vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,925 to be transferred into the Town of Montague Stabilization Fund, said sum to be raised from the remaining balance of Article #11 of the January 23, 2008 Town Meeting [Acquisitions/Appraisals].

**ARTICLE 25. MOVED:** That the Town vote to rescind the remaining \$760.19 in spending authority for the Pavement Management Study as voted under Article 25 of the May 7, 2005 Town Meeting.

**ARTICLE 26. MOVED:** That the Town vote to petition the State Legislature for an all alcohol license for the Carroll's Market Convenience Store.

**ARTICLE 27.** To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Resolution:

Bring the War \$ Home – Stop the Killing  
Montague, Massachusetts

“Whereas, the financial resources available for use by governments at the local, county, state, and federal levels in the United States are limited.

Whereas, an inordinate level of military expenditure is being made by the U.S. federal government for warfare in Iraq, Afghanistan and Pakistan:

Whereas, the people of Montague are collectively paying or becoming indebted for \$7.5 million since military operations began in 2001 (National Priorities Project estimate, does not include funds requested in FY2010.)

Whereas, this warfare creates great and unnecessary harm to the people of the nations of Iraq, Afghanistan and Pakistan and to U.S. military personnel and their families; and

Whereas, the education services, other essential public services, infrastructure repair and private sector financing in Montague and throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts have been substantially reduced in order for an excessive portion of available financial resources to be diverted from revenue sharing to unnecessary warfare,

Therefore be it resolved that:

1. A public discussion in Montague about the cost of the Wars in Iraq and Afghanistan/Pakistan to our community to education, transportation, security and basic citizen needs be initiated.
2. We ask our Board of Selectmen to call on Representative John Olver and Senators John Kerry and Scott Brown
  - a. to oppose all legislation brought before the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate that provides further funding of the U.S. warfare and U.S. military occupation in Iraq, Afghanistan and Pakistan and
  - b. to take strong and forceful action to influence the full U.S. House of Representatives to terminate funding of these military operations.
  - c. to sign onto and support resolutions that prohibit any increase in the number of troops in Afghanistan (House Resolution 3699).”
